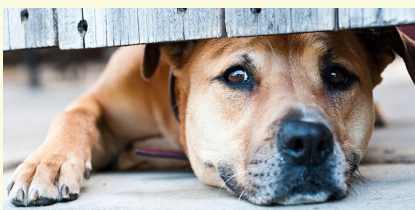

# A Message from the Library Director

I'm often asked, "Why did you become a librarian?" The quick answer is that I married two of my favorite worlds: books/information and public service. I've frequently referred to the library as a "brick and mortar PBS," an all-ages place of learning, discovery and community where any member of the public can enter and receive quality service and have access to a variety of educational and cultural materials. I believe that today, more than ever, the public library is vital to a community's success and development.

Ever since the establishment of the first tax-supported library in Peterborough, New Hampshire in 1833, libraries have provided communities knowledge and opportunity. Public libraries have been around for a long time, but today's public library has long since moved from simply being a place for books, to advancing into an institution of lifelong learning.

Where else can you walk into one place and take a technology class and check out a book/movie/magazine? Experience local art exhibits and take your child to a story-time program? Engage in a book discussion and learn how to download the latest best-seller to your device? Research how to start a business and type/print out your business plan?

The answer is nowhere else. There is no place in Lisle where you can do all of the above Monday through Sunday, most days until 9pm. Whether you are 8 or 80 years old, the Lisle Library District is the only non-profit, non-partisan and non-denominational institution where you can do all of these things...and more!

So, maybe you haven't utilized the Library in a number of months...years? Perhaps you have yet to visit the Library? The important thing to remember is that when you do walk through the doors, call/email or log-in from home, we will be here for you.

If you simply want to explore what we have to offer or if you desperately need to print that important document because your computer froze, we are here to serve you. We are your safety-net, your access point and your discovery place and I'm very proud to manage an institution that serves its community in this way -- and it's also why I sought a degree in librarianship.

## Q & A With Stained Glass Artist Paul Jarecki



Paul Jarecki is a long-time patron and local artist who recently honored the Library by making our logo the basis for a stained glass piece. We sat down to ask him a few questions.

### **When and how did you get your start as a stained glass artist?**

When? Last year, last winter. I started the project at my sister-in-law's gallery. They teach stained glass. I've never been much of a sketcher or a watercolor person, but stained glass sounded interesting. They gave me the steps: laying out the pieces, cutting them, fitting them, soldering, the whole process.

### **What was it about the Library logo that inspired you?**

When I first started it, I decided, if I'm going to use your logo, I should donate it. As long as I can go to the Library and see it, that's perfect. And other people can see it too. As Tatiana [the Library Director] and I talked about, there was a lot of thought that went into the [logo]

design, to fit the Lisle motifs. And I like the prairie style. A lot of straight lines, not too many curves. That's easier for a first piece.

### **How can libraries be an inspiration?**

Over the years, we've always been devoted patrons to the Library. We've always brought our kids here, and the employees actually knew them by first name. We homeschooled them, so we were always here. The donation just seemed like an ideal way to give back, it just seemed to make sense. I think we're coming to realize the importance and the value of the Library, not just as a book repository, but a community place, and a resource of knowledge. Not just a building to be maintained, but a community gathering spot. Meet staff, neighbors, new friends. Try new things. It's always been a delightful place to come.

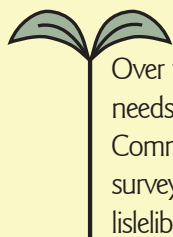


#### Devil In The Woodpile In Concert
